THE UNIVERSITY OF TRASH PUBLIC PROGRAMS: MAY 10 – AUGUST 3, 2009

The University of Trash is an experiment in alternative architecture, urbanism, and pedagogy taking place in SculptureCenter's main space. Drawing from utopian ideals and radical urban projects undertaken since the 1960s the artists will create an installation that functions as a temporary, makeshift University. Throughout the summer there will be a mix of workshops, screenings, and presentations focusing on grass roots, self-organized urbanism, DIY architecture and the evolving aesthetics and politics of public space. Except where noted, all events are free with museum admission. Reservations are welcome but not necessary.

SUMMARY OF WORKSHOPS

Saturday May 16th, 4 - 9 pm: Space for Revolution

Space for Revolution will include presentations and informal discussions that ask what a space for revolution can look like. Members of the **School of Walls and Space** (Copenhagen); **Baltimore Development Cooperative**, **Participation Park**, **the Baltimore Indyreader**, and organizers from the **City from Below Conference** will present their work in an informal setting. The discussion will open to questions of revolutionary space and the role of artists and other actors in organizing against global neoliberalism. This inaugural public program of the *University of Trash* will end with a performance by Brooklyn based band **Japanther**.

Saturday June 6th, 1 - 10 pm: The Right to the Airwaves

The Right to the Airwaves is a daylong workshop presented in collaboration with free103point9 exploring the radical potential of analog airwaves. The afternoon will begin with a radio transmitter building workshop covering the history of broadcasting, how transmitters work, online transmission tools, and transmission arts as a creative medium. At 5:00 PM Tom Roe (free103point9) and Andy Gunn (Prometheus Radio) will be joined by transmission artist neuroTransmitter for an informal discussion about their work and issues of free speech, free space, and the right to the airwaves. The evening will close with DJ sets by Tom Roe and Angel Navarez (neuroTransmitter) that will be broadcast live on the University of Trash internet and low power FM stations transmitted to boomboxes within the university. Presented in collaboration with free103point9

Note: There will be a \$25 materials fee for the transmitter building workshop and reservations are highly recommended as space is limited.

Saturday July 18th, 4 - 7 pm: Architectures of Crisis/ Architectures of Resistance

Architectures of Crisis/ Architectures of Resistance highlights the role of built space past and present in organizing radical movements and documenting shifting economic, social, and political

climates. The **Center for Urban Pedagogy** will present *Nehemiah! A Case Study of Radical Pragmatism*, a slideshow and discussion about a visionary project made real. **Teddy Cruz** and **Damon Rich** will discuss the economic crisis in relation to Rich's current exhibition *Red Lines Housing Crisis Learning Center* at the Queens Museum, and Cruz's ongoing work with the transborder urbanisms at the US and Mexico border region.

Baltimore Development Cooperative (BDC) is an artist collective with an interdisciplinary practice that uses art, research, and activism to critically engage with urban spatial politics.

Participation Park, a project of BDC, is an ongoing public art project and activist initiative based on converting a vacant lot in east Baltimore into an urban farm, social space, community kitchen, radical planning studio, free store, and adventure playground.
